



The 1996 Annual Report is exceptional as it also contains reports for the calendar years 1989 to 1995 which were not compiled due to unavoidable circumstances.

The period covered by the report witnessed very many challenges both in the growth mate and in the change in economic and political circles.


The growth was witnessed in the annual budget rising from Kshs. 40 million in 1989 to Kshs. 137 million in 1996. The municipality also witnessed growth in physical area from 107 sq. km. in 1989 to 200 sq.km. in 1996. This growth in area of course brought new expectations from residents within the extended areas as they expected more superior services than the ones provided previously by the County Council.

In the economic area the municipality has been undertaking various reforms through the Kenya Government Reform Programmes. Some of these are:

- 1. Licencing study that culminated in the introduction of oss (one stop shop) licences.
- 2. Pregaration of 5 year LADP (Local Authority Development Programme for 1995 to 2000)
- 3. Revenue Potential Study
- 4. Simplified Accounting System
- 5. Creation of autonomous Water and Sewerage Department etc.
  The aim of the above reform measures is to make the Council self sustainable.

In the political front the Council worked for the first time with a Multi-party Council which was elected in 1992. This was very challenging but the civic leaders very quickly adopted to the new system with the realisation that at the end of the day what matters is the quality of service that the residents of the municipality are receiving from the Council.

As we prepare to face the future challenges, we would like to rededicate ourselves to the ideals of the Local Government System and hope to see a strong Government which is politically and economically strong.



## ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1989 TO 1996

#### I. INTRODUCTION

This report is rendered in accordance with Section 243 of the Local Government Act Cap 265 of the Laws of Kenya.

Included in this report are reports of the Town Clerk's Department, Social Services Section, Municipal Treasurer's Department and Deputy General Manager (E)'s Department.

#### 2. HISTORY

The Municipal Council of Nyeri was elevated from Urban status to Municipal status vide Gazette Notice No. 61 of 1971.

#### 3. AREA

The area of the Municipality is now 200sq. kilometres. Before 1992 the area was only 176sq. kilometres.

## 4. POPULATION

The population of Nyeri Municipality has increased as a result of rural - urban migration in search of employment. It is approximately 100,000 of which 40% is in urban whereas 60% is in the rural agricultural area.



#### NYERI WATER SUPPLY

Ihwa and Chania intakes operated well with minor problems which were repaired immediately they were detected throughout the years.

Treatment works produced large volumes of water and tried to cope with the high demand using the following chemicals:

Water distribution was fair with minor bursts/leaks which were repaired as detected.

#### KIGANJO WATER SUPPLY:

## WATER AND SEWERAGE DEPARTMENT:

The Water and Sewerage Sections of the Engineer's Department separated from the mother department on 1.st July 1995 and together with a commercial section created from a subsection of

The Municipal Treasurer's Department formed the Water and Sewerage Department. The creation of the Department was as a result of recommendation by the Ministry of Local Government.

#### DEPARTMENTAL ORGANISATIONS:

This compr. ses the general administration unit and two divisions namely:

- General administration unit headed by the General Manager who is incharge of the department.
- Technical division headed by Deputy General Manager and comprising the following:
- (i) Water section with 15 units
- (ii) Sewerage section with 9 nnits
- (iii) Services section with 6 units
- Commercial Division headed by Deputy General Manager and comprising 10 units.

#### GENERAL ADMINISTRATION:

Engineer Nguiguti continued working in both the water and Sewerage and Engineer's Department.

#### TECHNICAL DIVISION:

The post of Deputy General Manager (T) remained vacant and the operation of the division were as follows:-

WATER SECTION: This section had a total number of 64 workers in the 15 units headed by a Water Superintendent.

#### IHWA WATER INTAKE:

There was only one major water burst on the gravity main. All the air valves and 5 cons valves were inspected and serviced.

CHANIA INTAKE: All pumping machineries operated well during the year.

TREATMENT WORKS:

A total of 2,116,000 m<sup>3</sup> of water was produced whereas the demand was estimated at over 4,380,000m<sup>3</sup>. Chemicals used were Aluminium sulphate, TCL and Soda Ash.

An estimated 1800 pipe leaks/bursts were reapaired during the year. A total of 307 new connection were effected and servicing of meters and replacements of stopped meters continued.

#### KIGANJO WATER SUPPLY

During the year the water and Sewerage formed its own department. Two new pumps were bought and installed. A total of 349,000m of water was produced against a demand of over 1000,000 m. The chemicals used were aluminium sulphate, T.C.L., soda ash. All bursts reported were regaired, new connections installed, seplacement of stopped meters and servicing of others continued.

#### SEWERAGE SECTION:

This section had a total of 9 units and was headed by Sewerage Superintendent. The exhauster service unit remained unestablished due to lack of an exhauster service vehicle. The section operated and maintained the two Sewerage systems i.e. Nyeri and Kiganjo.

#### NYERI SEWERAGE SYSTEM

This comprises the Kangemi Sewerage works with a capacity of c000M<sup>3</sup>/d D.W.F. and a system of four sewers servicing mainly Nyeri Cantral Business District. The works handled only a third of its capacity due to inadequate water in the town. Sludge and manure was produced at the works and fish reared at the maturation ponds. The following works were executed by this section:-

- painting of railings
- uprooting and planting of flowers on Kangemi Sewerage works compound.
- 3.5 sewer blockages were effected
- 9 sewer connection were effected
- A laboratory for monitoring the works performance is required
- A permanent vehicle for the section is required.

## KIGANJO SEWERAGE SYSTEM:

This comprises ponds at Gatei, a sewerage pumping station and a system of four sewers commencing at the Kiganjo town. The following works were carried out by the section during the years:

- Clearing of the pond embacement and roads at the pond
- Replacement of manhole covers stolen from Kiganjo site and service scheme.
- Maintenance of flowers at the pumping station
- Failure of operational pump discovered. .
- An attempted burglary liscovered.

#### SERVICES SECTION:

Only two of the quants were operational during the year i.e. electrical and mechanical units which carried out the following works:-

- maintenance of all water and sewerage electrical equipments at Chania intake, Kamakwa Water Treatment Works, Kiganjo intake Kiganjo Water Supply, Kiganjo Sewerage Pumping Station and the Kangemi Sewerage Treatment Plant.

Installation and commissioning of 2 new pumps at the Kiganjo intake.

- Maintenance of all other mechanical equipments at both the water and Sewerage section.

## COMMERCIAL DIVISION:

The division comprises of the following units: ..

- commercial administration
- budgeting and accounting
- purchasing and stores
- revenue collection
- Accounts and records
- public relations
- billing and despatch
- meter reading and inspection

#### DIVISION OPERATIONS:

The General Manager assisted by the Chief Accountant administered this section:-

- preparation of the divisional budgets based on units
- purchases depending on the Municipal Treasurer's Department as the staff establishment were not approved during the year.
- Revenue collection although this mostly relied on the Municipal Treasurer's for cash-safe-keeping and banking.
- Billing and computerising whereas two computers were bought for the water billing in August, 1995 for the Council by KFW through M/S H.P. Gauff Consulting Engineers who were also expected to train the billing clerks.

#### METER READING:

This section which had been in the technical division was transferred to the commercial division. The unit had two senior meter readers and three meter Readers. The unit carried out the following works:-

- meter reading
- meter disconnections and reconnection
- meter servicing.
