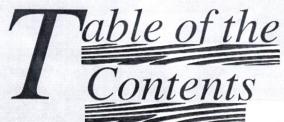

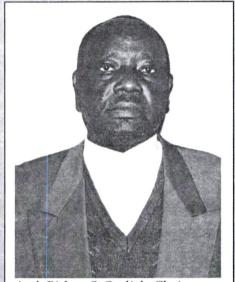
## Message from the chairman

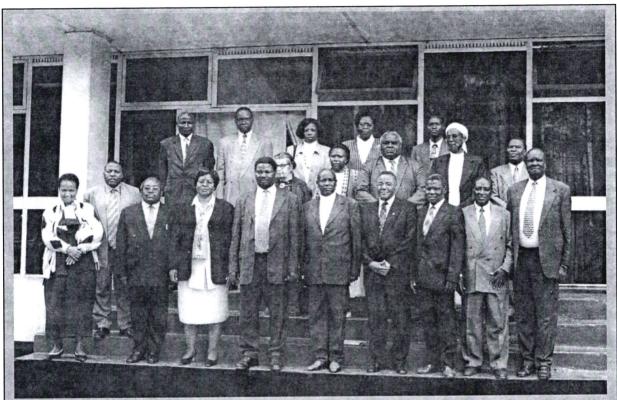

## Chief Executive's Report

It is the pleasure of the Kenya National Library Service Board to release the report and accounts for the financial year 2000/2001. The period under review was marked by significant strides by the board. Notably among these was the presentation of the KNLS/Carnegie project survey findings. After a rigorous countrywide survey on the status quo of public library system in Kenya, KNLS presented a comprehensive report on the study findings. The recipients included the Carnegie Corporation of New York, who had funded the survey exercise. This was preceded by the stakeholders' forum, which was used to disseminate the findings and chart the way forward for public library system.

#### Book Donation -

In its continued efforts to enhance a reading culture in Kenya, the KNLS Board in the year 2000/2001, received 40,981 books worth Ksh. 20,490,500 from the Book Aid International (BAI) UK. The books were received in 7528 direct consignments valued at Ksh. 3,764,000. Out of the books received, the Board donated a total of 29,977 books to various deserving institutions in Kenya. The balance (11,004 books) was retained by the board and distributed to various KNLS branches.

#### Kisumu Mobile **L**ibray

The British Council helped to repair the Kisumu mobile library, which had been grounded for some time.

## Operating Schedule

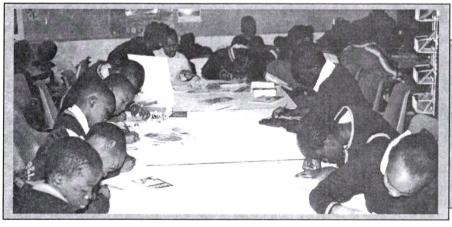
Promotion of Reading (Activities)

Due to the severe power blackouts experienced in 2000/2001, the KNLS Board re-scheduled the library's operating hours from 9.00 a.m. to 8.30 a.m. opening time and adjusted the closing time to 5.30 p.m. from 6.30 p.m. These measures were taken as it was discovered that after 5.30 p.m. it was not possible for the library users to use the natural lights inside the library.

National Book Week Celebrations: Between 9<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> September 2000, the KNLS Board hosted the National Book Week Celebrations in its 15 select branch libraries. To facilitate the success of this National function, the Board received a cash donation of Ksh. 460,000 from the National Book Development Council who are the main organizers of the National Book Week Celebrations. On its part, the Board donated 1,860 books to 110 institutions countrywide valued at Ksh. 580,000 on behalf of BAI. In addition, the Board gave as its donation of 12,376 books valued at Ksh. 4,996,000. The celebrations were attended by people from all walks of life.

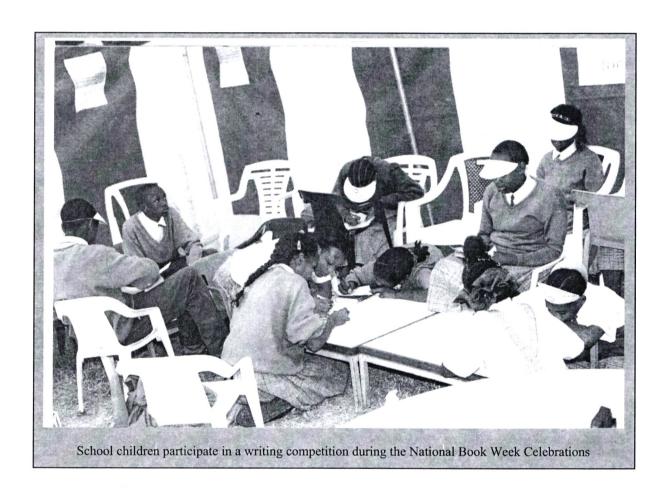

KNLS Website: As a way of popularizing its services and enabling the information seekers access to information about KNLS online, the Board installed the KNLS website, <a href="www.knls.or.ke">www.knls.or.ke</a>. The Board also acquired a lease line for Internet services.

### Library Usage

Readership: During the year, a total of 1,446,019 readers used the library services countrywide.

Membership: Library membership rose to 353,547. A total of 177,703 books were issued to readers.



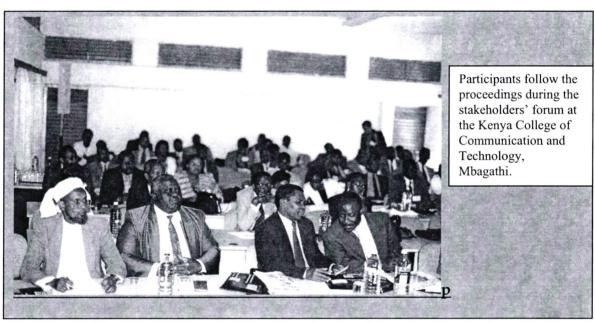
#### Security Services

In its attempts to improve security of the library stock and minimize the losses incurred. The KNLS Board contracted private security services at its Thika district library.

### Stakeholder's

Forum

In November 8 – 9 2000, the KNLS Board conducted a stakeholders' Forum that was aimed at bringing together various organizations and individuals, who have a stake in information as a vital resource. The outputs of the forum were used in the preparation of the KNLS 2001-2010 strategic plan. The forum also adopted the KNLS/Carnegie study project. The forum was held at a cost of ksh.823, 390.

In 2000/2001, the Board availed various training and development opportunities to its staff. This was done in recognition that staff training is a major component of quality work performance. Consequently, the Board engaged various staffs in the following courses.

## Seminars and Workshops

Regional Conference: KNLS Board in conjunction with the Force Foundation of Netherlands organized a regional conference for the directors of libraries for the blind between 25<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> October 2000. Various KNLS staff and some Board members attended. The cost of the conference was shared by both the Netherlands and the KNLS Board.

Berlin meeting: The International ISBN Agency Advisory panel meeting was held in Berlin in 2000. Emily Ng'eno of National Reference and Bibliographic department was sent by the Board to attend at a cost of Ksh.192,734.

Ghana International Book Fair: The Ghana International Book Faire was held in Accra between 11th and 17th November 2000. KNLS was represented by S. K. Ng'ang'a and Elizabeth Yegon. The cost was met by INASP.

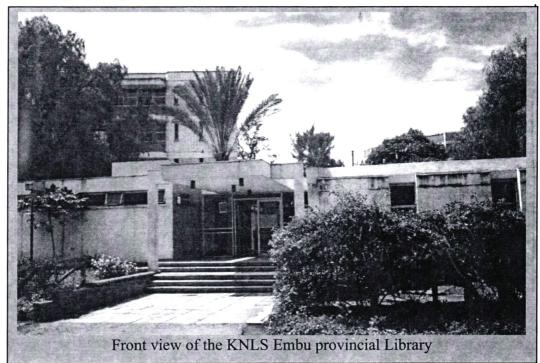
Strategic Planning Seminar: The KNLS/Carnegie strategic planning seminar was held at the Thomson Falls, Nyahururu between 23<sup>rd</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> November at a cost of Ksh.783, 000. This seminar was important as it formed the basis for writing the KNLS ten-year (2001-2010) strategic plan. It was attended by various KNLS heads of departments and senior staffs.

### Staff Welfare

- In recognition of the efforts made by staff in achieving the organization's objectives, the Board found it necessary to upgrade the staff positions as a way of motivating them. This was effected on 28th September 2000.
- The Board also approved the new house allowance rates for non-unionizable staffs. This was adjusted in accordance with the office of the President's circular ref. No.18/2/1A.
- End of year party for the staff was held on 11<sup>th</sup> December 2000 at the Panafric hotel.

## Rennovations

The Board managed to renovate the Embu and Kakamega Provincial libraries at a cost of Ksh.302, 330 and Ksh.301, 330 respectively.



## Challenges

During the year, the Board experienced various challenges, some of which hampered the effectiveness in the delivery of services. These include:

- Insufficient funds to amply cater for the library operations and development.
- Severe power blackouts that affected the whole country. This caused the Board to re-scheduled the library's operating hours from 9.00 a.m. to close at 5.30 p.m. instead of 6.30 p.m. The Board's operations were affected in various other ways.
- Dilapidated roofs of various library buildings. Most of the old library buildings have weak and leaking roofs, which have been worsened by lack of adequate finances to rehabilitate them.
- Inadequate reading materials to accommodate the increasing demand of the library users.

## Way Forward

The Board will pursue avenues that will enhance the implementation of the KNLS strategic plan.

The Board hopes to diversify its funding base by identifying more development partners and initiating cost containment measures.

The Board will continue to strengthen the partnerships with various stakeholders to support in realizing efficiency in the provision of library and information services to all parts of Kenya.

To attain effective service delivery, the Board intends to intensify skill up-grading programmes for staff development and capacity building.

#### Conclusion

As we begin the next financial year, we are optimistic that the good relationship that we have continued to enjoy from various partners will enable us realize our goal of having an information driven, and hence a knowledgeable society in Kenya. This, however, will only be achieved through the commitment and involvement of all those who have a stake in the information industry.

## REPORT OF THE CONTROLLER AND AUDITOR GENERAL ON THE ACCOUNTS OF THE KENYA NATIONAL LIBRARY SERVICE FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2001

I have examined the Accounts of Kenya National Library Service for the year ended 30 June 2001 in accordance with the provisions of Section 29 of the Exchequer and Audit Act, (Cap 412). I have obtained all the information and explanations required for the purpose of the audit. Proper books of account have been kept by the Library Service and the accounts which have been prepared under the historical cost convention are in agreement therewith and comply with the Kenya National Library Service Act, (Cap.225).

Except for the matters referred to herebelow, in my opinion, the accounts when read together with the notes thereon, give a true and fair view of the financial state of affairs of the Library Service as at 30 June 2001 and of its surplus and cash flow for the year ended on that date.

#### 1. FIXED ASSETS

As reported in the previous year the Fixed Assets balance of Kshs.192,068,640 includes the value of eight (8) plots without title deeds but excludes undetermined value of three plots with title deeds and eleven (11) plots without title deeds. Although management has initiated steps to acquire the title deeds, until the process is completed it would not be possible to confirm the correctness of the Balance Sheet Fixed Assets figure of Kshs.192,068,640 as at 30 June 2001 or even the ownership of the nineteen (19) plots of land.

#### 2. **LOSS OF BOOKS KSHS.2,382,381**

During the year 2000/2001 the Library Service lost a total of 7,935 copies of books valued at Kshs.1,760,410 which were reported missing from its branches countrywide. The Library Service also lost unspecified stocks of books valued at Kshs.621,971 thereby bringing the total value of the books lost to Kshs.2,382,381 as at 30 June, 2001. Although Management has instituted a number of measures to enhance security with a view to curbing the losses the effectiveness of these measures will only be gauged once they all have become operational. Further, although the Board of Directors, at its meeting held on 07 December, 2001 approved the loss to be written-off, no evidence was seen of efforts made to recover the loss from those who were involved before the write off option was taken.

#### (a) Accounting Convention

The Board's financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the Revaluation of Leasehold Land and buildings fixtures fittings and equipment's which are incorporated in these accounts.

#### (b) Depreciation

Depreciation is charged to write off the cost of fixed assets over their useful life using the straight line method at the following rates:-
