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Message from the Chairman

or the past financial year, the KNLS Board, in pursuit of its mandate, has upheld a prescribed behavior that has been geared towards efficiency and effectiveness in service delivery to the public. This has also been integrated to the Government's Poverty Reduction and Wealth Creation Strategies.

As a Board, we have placed our focus on empowering communities through dissemination of information to enable individuals to make informed decisions and actively participate in self and national development. In doing this, the Board has continued to enhance the provision of relevant and accessible library and information services to the rural areas and the disadvantaged communities. This has been made possible by the continued government and stakeholders' support, and community participation in the establishment of libraries.

The quest to fulfill the KNLS Board's mandate has nonetheless not been without challenges. Inadequate financing has continued to be a major drawback for the successful attainment of the KNLS goals. This has contributed to lack of sufficient relevant and accessible library and information materials. The introduction of free primary education has also had a strenuous impact on our library service provision. This has led to increased usage of our library materials and enormous demand for reading space especially during weekends and school holidays. Additionally, the inadequate capabilities experienced by some of the communities in contributing towards library development have further curtailed the provision of accessible and equitable distribution of library and information services by the Board.

In view of these challenges, the KNLS Board wishes to adopted deliberate efforts to strengthen partnerships with various stakeholders and well wishers to facilitate efficiency and effectiveness in library and information service provision to the public.

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From the Chief Executive's Desk

t is a pleasure for me to present, on behalf of the Kenya National Library Service (KNLS) Board, the annual and the audit report for the period 2002/2003.

In striving to provide effective and efficient library and information services, I wish to recognize the unequivocal commitment portrayed by the KNLS staff. Through their efforts, we were able to move progressively despite the many challenges that we faced. It is my hope that with greater commitment, we shall be able achieve more in the next financial year.

During the year under review, KNLS engaged in various diversified activities geared towards improving the library and information services to the public, as outlined here below.

1. Promotion of reading

In 2002/2003 the KNLS Board acquired a total of 56,228 books, most of which were donations from various development partners who included Book Aid International and International Book Bank. The rest were acquired through Government funding.

Book Aid International (BAI) from UK continued to be the leading donor of

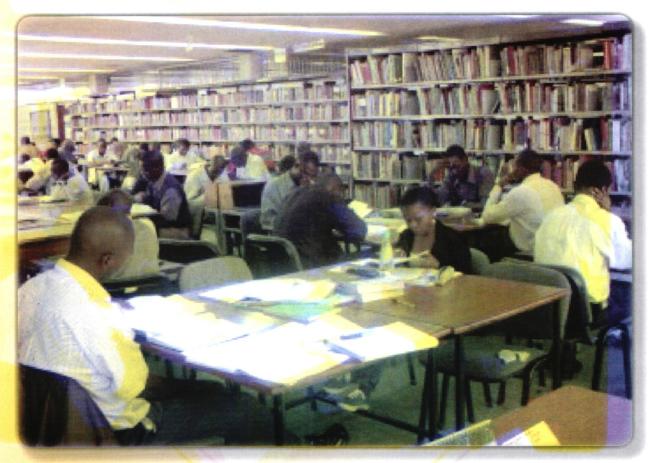
books to the KNLS Board. During the year, the organization donated 46,534 books out of which 13,188 were distributed to various local institutions. The remaining 45,737 books were absorbed within the KNLS network of branches.

In September 2002 and April 2003, the Board hosted the National Book Week and the World Book and Copyright Day Celebrations respectively. The National Book Development Council (Kenya) donated funds to facilitate the Book Week celebrations in 15 KNLS branches. The other branches were catered for by the KNLS Board. The celebrations were marked with various activities such as reading and writing competitions for children, story telling, book exhibitions, dance and drama, among others.

Promotion of reading was also extended to the Agricultural Society of Kenya Shows, where some of the branch libraries participated in the event within their regions.

In its quest to provide accessible library and information services to the public, the KNLS Board in partnership with the communities established an additional three community based libraries in Coast Province during the year under review. These were Malindi, Kilifi and Dzitsoni

Libraries. Prior to that, the entire Coast Province was only being served by two KNLS libraries; the Mombasa Provincial and Wundanyi District Libraries. This was therefore a major milestone in the provision of library services to the Coast Province publics.

2. Training

The development of staff for efficient service delivery continued to be the focus of the Board's attention during the year 2002/2003. Consequently, a total of 148 staff were trained by the Board at various levels both locally and in overseas training institutions as follows:-

3. Government support

The achievement's attained by the Board were made possible by the continued government support. During the year under review, the government increased its support to KNLS in terms of book grant to by Ksh. 10 million. KNLS also received support to Community Based Libraries (CBLs) amounting to Ksh. 10 million. This was in recognition of the important role that KNLS is playing in empowering communities through information dissemination.

KNLS also received Ksh. 5 million being part of the government's commitment towards the establishment of the National Library for the Visually Impaired Persons, at the KNLS headquarters. The co-funder of the project is the Desai Memorial Foundation. It is hoped that the two partners will honor their pledges to facilitate the commencement of the project. The total cost of the project is estimated at Ksh. 110 million.

4. KNLS/Carnegie Project

During the year under review, the actual implementation of the 3-year KNLS/ Carnegie project was commenced in the

five model libraries, which are Nairobi, Mombasa, Kisumu, Nyeri and Eldoret. The broad project activities for year one were:

- Establishment of a Development Office
- Upgrading of book stock
- Integration of ICTs
 - ✓ ICT survey
 - ✓ Development of ICT policy
 - ✓ Networking
- Staff training

It is expected that the five selected model libraries will be comprehensively revitalized at the end of the three-year period and that they would be replicated both locally and regionally.

KNLS Board therefore makes a passionate appeal to organizations, individuals and all well-wishers to assist in whatever way possible to ensure accessibility of quality library and information services to all Kenyans. Previous assistance received by KNLS has been in terms of:

- Donation of books and other reading materials
- ✓ Donation of library plots
- Donation of and construction of library buildings
- Donation of computers and library furniture
- √ Sponsorship for staff training, among

other things.

As we move into the next financial year, it's our hope that more groups and individuals will find it a worthy course to partner with KNLS Board in promoting a reading culture among the Kenyan society.

In conclusion, I take this opportunity to convey our sincere thanks to all our library users country wide, for making use of the materials and facilities that the KNLS Board has availed to them. We appreciate that we have not been able to meet all their information needs. We however wish to assure them and in deed all Kenyans that we will optimally use the resources available to us to address the library user's requirements.

REPORT OF THE CONTROLLER AND AUDITOR GENERAL ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OF THE KENYA NATIONAL LIBRARY SERVICE FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2003

I have examined the financial statements of Kenya National Library Service for the year ended 30 June 2003 in accordance with the provisions of Section 29 of the Exchequer and Audit Act (Cap 412). I have obtained all the information and explanations considered necessary for the purpose of the audit. Proper books of account have been kept and the financial statements, which have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of leasehold land and buildings, fixtures, fittings and equipment are in agreement therewith and comply with the Kenya National Library Services Act, (Cap 225)

FIXED ASSETS

The fixed Assets figure of Kshs.208, 911,067 as at June, 2003 does not include value for seven (7) and nine (9) developed and undeveloped plots respectively situated in various parts of the country for which no ownership documents were availed for audit verification. The Kenya National Library Service has however, explained that the applications for ownership documents have been made to the Commissioner of Lands. However, until the plots are registered in the Kenya Library Service name and valued, it will not be possible to confirm the ownership of the assets or the carrying value of fixed assets.

Except for the foregoing reservation, in my opinion, the financial statements when read together with the notes, present fairly the financial state of affairs of the Kenya National Library Service as at 30 June, 2003 and of its surplus and cash flow for the year then ended.
