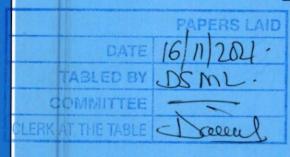

2. FORWARD NOTE BY THE CLERK OF THE COUNTY ASSEMBLY

The Taita Taveta Revolving Car Loan Scheme fund is a revolving fund established pursuant to the Salaries and Remuneration Circular no SRC/ADM/CIR/1/13/ Vol III (128) of 17th December 2014. Section 167 of the Public Finance Management Act 2012 mandates the Administrator of Public Funds with preparation of Annual Financial Statements

For proper management of the fund, the Taita Taveta Revolving Car Loan Scheme Fund adopted Public Finance Management (Taita Taveta Revolving Car Loan Scheme fund) Regulations 2014 to guide operationalization of the Fund.

The Fund started its operations in 2014 following the gazettement of the Taita Taveta Revolving Car Loan Scheme regulation 2014. It received an initial amount of Ksh. 60M.

The Salaries and Remuneration Commission in its circular ref SRC/ADM/CIR/1/13 Vol.III (128) dated 17 December 2014 provided guidelines for access of Car Loan and Mortgage benefits by all state and public officers. Arising there from the County Assembly Committee Members approved and adopted the Staff Loans Policy Paper on 27th March 2014. On 20th August 2014 the Fund Committee Members approved and adopted the guidelines on internal administration of the Car Loan Scheme Funds.

3. REPORT OF THE FUND ADMINISTRATOR

It is my pleasure to present the Taita Taveta Revolving Car Loan Scheme FundFinancial Statements for the year ended 30th June 2019. The financial statements present the financial performance of the fund over the past year.

The fund was established on 27th March 2014 and started with an initial amount of Kshs60M Since then, a total of 49 loan beneficiaries have made borrowings amounting to Kshs51 M.

Financial Performance

a) Revenue

In the year ended 30th June, 2019, the fund had projected revenues of Kshs 30,000,000 Consisting of Kshs 28.5 million as Transfers from Govt and Kshs 1.5 million as interest Receivable. Due to cash flow challenges, the fund couldn't realise the budget.

b) Loans

During the financial year 2018/2019, the fund disbursed 21 additional loans.

c) Cash flows

In the FY 2018/2019, the cash and cash equivalents decreased from KShs 732,512 as at 30th June 2018 to KShs 93,171 as at 30th June 2019.

d) Conclusion

FY 2018/2019 was a good year in general. Good progress was made and the momentum has been created to enable Taita Taveta Revolving Car Loan Scheme Fund continue on a trajectory into prosperity. We have identified gaps and areas to improve on in the subsequent years.

4. STATEMENT OF MANAGEMENT'S RESPONSIBILITIES

Section 167 of the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 requires that, at the end of each financial year, the Administrator of a County Public Fund established by The Taita Taveta County Gazette Supplementary No. 16, shall prepare financial statements for the Fund in accordance with the standards and formats prescribed by the Public Sector Accounting Standards Board.

The Administrator of the County Public Fund is responsible for the preparation and presentation of the Fund's financial statements, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Fund for and as at the end of the financial year ended on June 30, 2019. This responsibility includes: (i) maintaining adequate financial management arrangements and ensuring that these continue to be effective throughout the reporting period; (ii) maintaining proper accounting records, which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Fund; (iii) designing, implementing and maintaining internal controls relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements, and ensuring that they are free from material misstatements, whether due to error or fraud; (iv) safeguarding the assets of the Fund; (v) selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies; and (vi) making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

The Administrator of the County Public Fund accepts responsibility for the Fund's financial statements, which have been prepared using appropriate accounting policies supported by reasonable and prudent judgements and estimates, in conformity with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS), and in the manner required by the PFM Act, 2012 and Taita Taveta County Gazette Supplementary No. 16. The Administrator of the Fund is of the opinion that the Fund's financial statements give a true and fair view of the state of Fund's transactions during the financial year ended June 30, 2019, and of the Fund's financial position as at that date. The Administrator further confirm the completeness of the accounting records maintained for the Fund, which have been relied upon in the preparation of the Fund's financial statements as well as the adequacy of the systems of internal financial control.

In preparing the financial statements, the Administrator of the County Public Fund has assessed the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern and disclosed, as applicable, matters relating to the use of going concern basis of preparation of the financial statements. Nothing has come to the attention of the Administrator to indicate that the Fund will not remain a going concern for at least the next twelve months from the date of this statement.

REPORT OF THE AUDITOR-GENERAL ON COUNTY ASSEMBLY OF TAITA TAVETA CAR LOAN SCHEME FUND FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE, 2019

REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Qualified Opinion

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of County Assembly of Taita Taveta Car Loan Scheme Fund set out on pages 8 to 33, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 June, 2019, and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in net assets, statement of cash flows and statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information in accordance with the provisions of Article 229 of the Constitution of Kenya and Section 35 of the Public Audit Act, 2015. I have obtained all the information and explanations which, to the best of my knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purpose of the audit.

In my opinion, except for the effect of the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of my report, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of County Assembly of Taita Taveta Car Loan Scheme Fund as at 30 June, 2019, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended, in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (Accrual Basis) and comply with County Assembly of Taita Taveta Car Loan Scheme Fund Regulations, 2019 and the Public Finance Management Act, 2012.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

1. Unexplained Balances

1.1 Revaluation Loss

The statement of changes in net assets for the year ended 30 June, 2019 reflects revaluation loss of Kshs.2,162,953 which was not explained or supported by way of a disclosure note.

1.2 Restated Reserves and Surplus Balances

The statement of financial position as at 30 June, 2019 reflects restated comparative balance of reserves and deficit of Kshs.1,500,947 and Kshs.1,887,522 respectively which have no disclosure note to explain the nature of these restatements.

Consequently, the financial statements presented for the year ended 30 June, 2019 do not conform to International Public Sector Accounting Standard No.1 on presentation of financial statements as prescribed and published by the Public Sector Accounting Standards Board.

2. Unsupported Loan Disbursements

As previously reported, the statement of cash flows for the year ended 30 June, 2019 reflects loan disbursements paid out balance of Kshs.29,446,000 (2017/2018 – Kshs.17,780,779). However, the loans disbursed were not supported with sale agreements or duly completed hire purchase forms, contrary to Regulation 7(1) of the Taita Taveta County Assembly Car Loan Scheme Fund Regulations, 2019 which requires that a member of the Scheme wishing to apply for a loan from the Fund to present to the officer administering the Fund the following;

- a) a sale agreement or a duly completed hire purchase proposal form in such form as the committee may prescribe;
- b) a valuation report of the vehicle from government registered agency.

Further, and as previously reported, original log-books to confirm that the vehicles are jointly registered between the County Assembly Service Board of Taita Taveta and the beneficiaries were not availed for audit review. This is contrary to Regulation 8(2) of the Taita Taveta County Assembly Car Loan Scheme Fund Regulations, 2019 which requires that the log-book of a vehicle subject to a loan from the Fund to be registered and issued jointly between the County Assembly Service Board of Taita Taveta and the member of the Scheme and should be kept in safe custody of the officer administering the Fund until the loan is repaid in full by the member of the Scheme.

Consequently, the ownership and valuation of loan disbursements of Kshs.29,446,000 for the year ended could not be confirmed.

3. Current Portion of Long-Term Receivables from Exchange Transactions

As previously reported, the statement of financial position as at 30 June, 2019 reflects current portion of long term receivables from exchange transactions balance of Kshs.51,369,348 as disclosed in Note 12 to the financial statements. Included in this balance is current portion of long-term receivables from exchange transactions balance of Kshs.17,634,034 of which Kshs.1,021,385.25 relates to loans owed by eleven (11) former Members of County Assembly who have defaulted in repaying the loans. The loans have since accrued interest amounting to Kshs.59,081.36 for the year under review, (2017/2018 - Kshs.25,087), all totalling to Kshs.84,168.36 as at 30 June, 2019.

Consequently, the recoverability of the loan balance of Kshs.1,021,385.25 and the accuracy and completeness of current portion of long-term receivables from exchange transactions balance of Kshs.17,634,034 as at 30 June, 2019 could not be confirmed.

The audit was conducted in accordance with International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAIs). I am independent of County Assembly of Taita Taveta Car Loan Scheme Fund in accordance with ISSAI 130 on Code of Ethics. I have fulfilled other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the ISSAI and in accordance with other ethical requirements applicable to performing audits of financial statements in Kenya. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified opinion.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in my professional judgment, are of most significance in the audit of the financial statements. There were no key audit matters to report in the year under review.

Other Matter

1.0 Budgetary Control and Performance

1.1 Revenue Budget

During the year under review, the Fund had an approved revenue budget of Kshs.30,000,000 against actual revenue of Kshs.19,486,319 or 65%, resulting to a revenue shortfall of Kshs.10,513,681 or 35% as summarized below:

The above summary indicates that the Fund had a revenue shortfall of Kshs.10,513,681 which could be due to unrealistic over budgeting of transfers from the County Government of Kshs.10,045,000. This is contrary to Regulation 29(2) of the Public Finance Management (County Governments) Regulations, 2015 which requires all services which can be reasonably foreseen to be included in the estimates and that the estimates are as complete as possible.

Consequently, the Fund may not meet its core mandate of giving car loans to Members and staff of Taita Taveta County Assembly, a situation which may negatively affect service delivery.

1.2 Expenditure Budget

During the year under review, the County Assembly of Taita Taveta Revolving Car Loan Scheme Fund had a total expenditure budget of Kshs.30,000,000 against actual

expenditure of Kshs.30,067,690, resulting to net over absorption of Kshs.67,690 or 0.1 % as summarized below:

The budget was not executed as per Regulation 29(2) of the Public Finance Management (County Governments) Regulations, 2015 which requires all services which can be reasonably foreseen to be included in the estimates and that the estimates are as complete as possible. Further, approval of the County Assembly for the over expenditure of loans advanced of Kshs.71,000 or 0.2% was not availed for audit review.

As a result, there is need for the Fund Administrator to evaluate budget making mechanism with a view to allocating more resources to loan advances to achieve the intended objective of the Fund.

REPORT ON LAWFULNESS AND EFFECTIVENESS IN USE OF PUBLIC RESOURCES

Conclusion

As required by Article 229(6) of the Constitution, based on the audit procedures performed, except for the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion and Basis for Conclusion on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in Use of Public Resources sections of my report, I confirm that, nothing else has come to my attention to cause me to believe that public resources have not been applied lawfully and in an effective way.

Basis for Conclusion

1. Irregular Issuance of Loan

The statement of cash flows for the year ended 30 June, 2019 reflects loan disbursements paid out of Kshs.29,446,000. Included in this amount is Kshs.2,500,000 which was advanced to a Member of County Assembly (MCA) who had an outstanding loan balance of Kshs.2,058,415 as at 1 July 2018. As at 30 June, 2019, the total outstanding loan balance for the MCA was Kshs.3,657,383. This is contrary to Regulation 10 of the Taita Taveta County Assembly Car Loan Scheme Fund Regulations, 2019 which sets the maximum amount of loan to be granted to a member of County Assembly at two million shillings.

Consequently, the Fund Management is in breach of the Law.

2. Irregular Transfer from the Fund

As previously reported, Note 12 to the financial statements for the year ended 30 June, 2019 reflects receivables from exchange transactions balance of Kshs.85,699,557. Included in this balance is Kshs.7,918,059 comprising Kshs.3,950,000 receivable from County Assembly Mortgage Fund and Kshs.3,968,059 receivable from County Assembly. The transfer was contrary to Section 116 (4) of the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 which requires the Administrator of a county public fund to ensure that money held in the Fund, including any earnings or accruals is spent only for the purposes for which the Fund is established.

Consequently, the Fund Management is in breach of the Law.

3. Failure to Insure Loans Disbursed

Note 12 to the financial statements reflects receivables from exchange transactions balance of Kshs.85,699,557. Included in this balance is outstanding loans balance of Kshs.51,964,243 comprising current portion of long-term receivables from exchange transactions balance of Kshs.17,634,034 and long-term receivables from exchange transactions balance of Kshs.34,330,209. However, the outstanding balance had not been insured, contrary to Regulation 13 (3) of the Taita Taveta County Assembly Car Loan Scheme Fund Regulations, 2019 which requires every loan granted to be insured for the benefit of the Member of the Scheme and the Taita Taveta County Assembly Car Loan Fund.

Consequently, the Fund is in breach of the Law and recoverability of Kshs.51,964,243 in case of default for the year ended 30 June, 2019 could not be confirmed.

The audit was conducted in accordance with ISSAI 4000. The standard requires that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain assurance about whether the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements are in compliance, in all material respects, with the authorities that govern them. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my conclusion.

REPORT ON EFFECTIVENESS OF INTERNAL CONTROLS, RISK MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNANCE

Conclusion

As required by Section 7(1)(a) of the Public Audit Act, 2015, based on the audit procedures performed, except for the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion and Basis for Conclusion on Effectiveness of Internal Controls, Risk Management and Governance sections of my report, I confirm that, nothing else has come to my attention to cause me to believe that internal controls, risk management and overall governance were not effective.

Basis for Conclusion

Failure to Develop Risk Management Strategy

The County Assembly of Taita Taveta Revolving Car Loan Scheme Fund Board has not developed risk management strategies. This is contrary to Regulation 158(1) of the Public Finance Management (County Governments) Regulations, 2015 which states that 'the Accounting Officer shall ensure that (a) the county government entity develops risk management strategies, which include fraud prevention mechanism; and (b) the county government entity develops a system of risk management and internal control that builds robust business operations. Failure to develop a risk management strategy may impair the effectiveness of the Board in managing a robust business operation of the Fund'.

Consequently, the Fund management did not comply with the Law and its effectiveness in handling risks could not be ascertained.

The audit was conducted in accordance with ISSAI 2315 and ISSAI 2330. The standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain assurance about whether effective processes and systems of internal control, risk management and governance were operating effectively, in all material respects. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my conclusion.

Responsibilities of Management and those Charged with Governance

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (Accrual Basis) and for maintaining effective internal control as Management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error and for its assessment of the effectiveness of internal control, risk management and governance.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for Fund's ability to sustain services disclosing, as applicable, matters related sustainability of services and using the applicable basis of accounting unless Management is aware of the intention to terminate the Fund or cease operations.

Management is also responsible for the submission of the financial statements to the Auditor-General in accordance with the provisions of Section 47 of the Public Audit Act, 2015.

In addition to the responsibility for the preparation and presentation of the financial statements described above, Management of the Fund is also responsible for ensuring that the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements are in compliance with the authorities which govern them, and that public resources are applied in an effective way.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Fund's financial reporting process, reviewing the effectiveness of how the entity monitors compliance with

relevant legislative and regulatory requirements, ensuring that effective processes and systems are in place to address key roles and responsibilities in relation to governance and risk management, and ensuring the adequacy and effectiveness of the control environment.

Auditor-General's Responsibilities for the Audit

The audit objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion in accordance with the provisions of Section 48 of the Public Audit Act, 2015 and submit the audit report in compliance with Article 229(7) of the Constitution. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISSAIs will always detect a material misstatement and weakness when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

In addition to the audit of the financial statements, a compliance audit is planned and performed to express a conclusion about whether, in all material respects, the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements are in compliance with the authorities that govern them and that public resources are applied in an effective way, in accordance with the provisions of Article 229(6) of the Constitution and submit the audit report in compliance with Article 229(7) of the Constitution.

Further, in planning and performing the audit of the financial statements and audit of compliance, I consider internal control in order to give an assurance on the effectiveness of internal controls, risk management and governance processes and systems in accordance with the provisions of Section 7(1)(a) of the Public Audit Act, 2015 and submit the audit report in compliance with Article 229(7) of the Constitution. My consideration of the internal control would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control that might be material weaknesses under the ISSAIs. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements caused by error or fraud in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions.

Because of its inherent limitations, internal control may not prevent or detect misstatements and instances of non-compliance. Also, projections of any evaluation of effectiveness to future periods are subject to the risk that controls may become inadequate because of changes in conditions, or that the degree of compliance with the policies and procedures may deteriorate.

As part of an audit conducted in accordance with ISSAIs, I exercise professional judgement and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the Fund's financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the Management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the Management's use of sustainability of services
 basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material
 uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the
 Fund's ability to sustain its services. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I
 am required to draw attention in the auditor's report to the related disclosures in the
 financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My
 conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my audit report.
 However, future events or conditions may cause the Fund to cease to continue to
 sustain its services.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

5.6. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. Statement of compliance and basis of preparation

The Fund's financial statements have been prepared in accordance with and comply with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS). The financial statements are presented in Kenya shillings, which is the functional and reporting currency of the Fund. The accounting policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented.

The financial statements have been prepared on the basis of historical cost, unless stated otherwise. The cash flow statement is prepared using the direct method. The financial statements are prepared on accrual basis.

3. Revenue recognition

i) Revenue from non-exchange transactions

Transfers from other government entities

Revenues from non-exchange transactions with other government entities are measured at fair value and recognized on obtaining control of the asset (cash, goods, services and property) if the transfer is free from conditions and it is probable that the economic benefits or service potential related to the asset will flow to the entity and can be measured reliably.

ii) Revenue from exchange transactions

Interest income

Interest income is accrued using the effective yield method. The effective yield discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to that asset's net carrying amount. The method applies this yield to the principal outstanding to determine interest income each period.

4. Budget information

The original budget for FY 2018/2019 was approved by the County Assembly 30th June 2018 Subsequent revisions or additional appropriations were made to the approved budget in accordance with specific approvals from the appropriate authorities. The additional appropriations are added to the original budget by the entity upon receiving the respective approvals in order to conclude the final budget.

The entity's budget is prepared on a different basis to the actual income and expenditure disclosed in the financial statements. The financial statements are prepared on accrual basis using a classification based on the nature of expenses in the statement of financial performance, whereas the budget is prepared on a cash basis. The amounts in the financial statements were recast from the accrual basis to the cash basis and reclassified by presentation to be on the same basis as the approved budget. A comparison of budget and actual amounts, prepared on a comparable basis to the approved budget, is then presented in the statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts.

In addition to the Basis difference, adjustments to amounts in the financial statements are also made for differences in the formats and classification schemes adopted for the presentation of the financial statements and the approved budget.

A statement to reconcile the actual amounts on a comparable basis included in the statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts and the actuals as per the statement of financial performance has been presented under section - of these financial statements.

5. Property, plant and equipment

All property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items. When significant parts of property, plant and equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, the entity recognizes such parts as individual assets with specific useful lives and depreciates them accordingly. Likewise, when a major inspection is performed, its cost is recognized in the carrying amount of the plant and equipment as a replacement if the recognition criteria are satisfied. All other repair and maintenance costs are recognized in surplus or deficit as incurred. Where an asset is acquired in a non-exchange transaction for nil or nominal consideration the asset is initially measured at its fair value.

6. Intangible assets

Intangible assets acquired separately are initially recognized at cost. The cost of intangible assets acquired in a non-exchange transaction is their fair value at the date of the exchange. Following initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. Internally generated intangible assets, excluding capitalized development costs, are not capitalized and expenditure is reflected in surplus or deficit in the period in which the expenditure is incurred.

The useful life of the intangible assets is assessed as either finite or indefinite.

7. Financial instruments

Financial assets

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets within the scope of IPSAS 29 Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement are classified as financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit, loans and receivables, held-to-maturity investments or available-for-sale financial assets, as appropriate. The Entity determines the classification of its financial assets at initial recognition.

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. After initial measurement, such financial assets are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method, less impairment. Amortized cost is calculated by taking into account anydiscount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the effective interest rate. Losses arising from impairment are recognized in the surplus or deficit.

Held-to-maturity

Non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments and fixed maturities are classified as held to maturity when the Entity has the positive intention and ability to hold it to maturity. After initial measurement, held-to-maturity investments are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method, less impairment. Amortized cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the effective interest rate. The losses arising from impairment are recognized in surplus or deficit.

Impairment of financial assets

The Entity assesses at each reporting date whether there is objective evidence that a financial asset or an entity of financial assets is impaired. A financial asset or an entity of financial assets is deemed to be impaired if, and only if, there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events that has occurred after the initial recognition of the asset (an incurred 'loss event') and that loss event has an impact on the estimated future cashflows of the financial asset or the entity of financial assets that can be reliably estimated. Evidence of impairment may include the following indicators:

- > The debtors or an entity of debtors are experiencing significant financial difficulty
- Default or delinquency in interest or principal payments
- > The probability that debtors will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganization
- Deservable data indicates a measurable decrease in estimated future cash flows (e.g. changes in arrears or economic conditions that correlate with defaults)

Financial liabilities

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities within the scope of IPSAS 29 are classified as financial liabilities at fair value through surplus or deficit or loans and borrowings, as appropriate. The Entity determines the classification of its financial liabilities at initial recognition.

All financial liabilities are recognized initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings, plus directly attributable transaction costs.

Loans and borrowing

After initial recognition, interest bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method. Gains and losses are recognized in surplus or deficit when the liabilities are recognized as well as through the effective interest method amortization process.

Amortized cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the effective interest rate.

8. Inventories

Inventory is measured at cost upon initial recognition. To the extent that inventory was received through non-exchange transactions (for no cost or for a nominal cost), the cost of the inventory is its fair value at the date of acquisition.

Costs incurred in bringing each product to its present location and conditions are accounted for, as follows:

- Raw materials: purchase cost using the weighted average cost method
- Finished goods and work in progress: cost of direct materials and labour and a proportion of manufacturing overheads based on the normal operating capacity, but excluding borrowing costs

After initial recognition, inventory is measured at the lower of cost and net realizable value. However, to the extent that a class of inventory is distributed or deployed at no charge or for a nominal charge, that class of inventory is measured at the lower of cost and current replacement cost.

Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of operations, less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale, exchange, or distribution.

Inventories are recognized as an expense when deployed for utilization or consumption in the ordinary course of operations of the Entity.

9. Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the Entity has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits or service potential will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

Where the Entity expects some or all of a provision to be reimbursed, for example, under an insurance contract, the reimbursement is recognized as a separate asset only when the reimbursement is virtually certain.

The expense relating to any provision is presented in the statement of financial performance net of any reimbursement.

Contingent liabilities

The Entity does not recognize a contingent liability, but discloses details of any contingencies in the notes to the financial statements, unless the possibility of an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits or service potential is remote.

Contingent assets

The Entity does not recognize a contingent asset, but discloses details of a possible asset whose existence is contingent on the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Entity in the notes to the financial statements. Contingent assets are assessed continually to ensure that developments are appropriately reflected in the financial statements. If it has become virtually certain that an inflow of economic benefits or service potential will arise and the asset's value can be measured reliably, the asset and the related revenue are recognized in the financial statements of the period in which the change occurs.

10. Changes in accounting policies and estimates

The Entity recognizes the effects of changes in accounting policy retrospectively. The effects of changes in accounting policy are applied prospectively if retrospective application is impractical.

11. Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs are capitalized against qualifying assets as part of property, plant and equipment. Such borrowing costs are capitalized over the period during which the asset is being acquired or constructed and borrowings have been incurred. Capitalization ceases when construction of the asset is complete. Further borrowing costs are charged to the statement of financial performance.

12. Related parties

The Entity regards a related party as a person or an entity with the ability to exert control individually or jointly, or to exercise significant influence over the Entity, or vice versa. Members of key management are regarded as related parties and comprise the directors, the CEO and senior managers.

13. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and cash at bank, short-term deposits on call and highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less, which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value. Bank account balances include amounts held at the Central Bank of Kenya and at various commercial banks at the end of the financial year. For the purposes of these financial statements, cash and cash equivalents also include short term cash imprests and advances to authorised public officers and/or institutions which were not surrendered or accounted for at the end of the financial year.

14. Comparative figures

Where necessary comparative figures for the previous financial year have been amended or reconfigured to conform to the required changes in presentation.
