## **CHAIRPERSON'S FOREWORD**

This report details the consideration by the Departmental Committee on Social Protection of the National Youth Council (Amendment) Bill, 2023 (National Assembly Bill No. 1 of 2023). The Bill seeks to amend sections 2, 5 and 6 of the National Youth Council Act No. 10 of 2009 to align the Act with Article 260 of the Constitution in respect to reference of the terms “Cabinet Secretary” and the “Principal Secretary”.

The Bill also seeks to provide for the nomination of nine youths through a competitive process by the Cabinet Secretary responsible for youth affairs to be members of the Council and to confer upon the Council the power to create branches from the ward to the national level and such other branches as it may deem necessary or desirable for the promotion of youth empowerment and development.

The Bill was published on 9<sup>th</sup> February, 2023 and read a First Time in the House on 22<sup>nd</sup> March, 2023. It was thereafter committed to the Departmental Committee on Social Protection for consideration and reporting to the House pursuant to the provision of Standing Order 127.

Article 118(1) (b) of the Constitution and Standing Order 127(3) require Parliament to facilitate public participation and involvement in the legislative and other business of Parliament and its Committees. In compliance with the foregoing, the Committee, through the placement of adverts in the print media on 4<sup>th</sup> April, 2023 (Annex 3), invited the public and interested stakeholders to submit memoranda on the proposed amendment.

From the foregoing, the Committee received submissions from Mr. Kevin Rutto, Mr. Kinuthia Ndungu, the Collaborative Centre for Gender and Development, YSO Consortium, North Rift Ambassadors, Inter Parties Youth Forum, Kenya Young Members of County Assemblies, Youth Senate Organization, Uzalendo Afrika Initiative, Article 43, Mwafrika Mwenzangu, Nubian Youth Council, ANC Political Party Youth League, Simama Community based organization, The National Youth Council and the Ministry of Youth Affairs, the Arts and Sports. The Committee thereafter held meetings with The National Youth Council and the Ministry of Youth Affairs, the Arts and Sports and The Hon. Joshua Chepyegon Kandie, M.P. the sponsor of the bill.

## PART II

### 2.0 INTRODUCTION AND OVERVIEW OF THE NATIONAL YOUTH COUNCIL (AMENDMENT) BILL, 2023

5. The National Youth Council (Amendment) Bill, 2023 (National Assembly Bill No. 1 of 2023) sponsored by Hon. Joshua Chepyegon Kandie was published on 9<sup>th</sup> February, 2023 and read a First Time in the House on 22<sup>nd</sup> March, 2023. It was thereafter committed to the Departmental Committee on Social Protection for consideration and reporting to the House pursuant to the provision of Standing Order 127.
6. The Bill seeks to amend sections 2, 5 and 6 of the National Youth Council Act No. 10 of 2009 to align the Act with Article 260 of the Constitution in respect to reference of the terms “Cabinet Secretary” and the “Principal Secretary”. The Bill also seeks to provide for the nomination of nine youths through a competitive process by the Cabinet Secretary responsible for youth affairs to be members of the Council and to confer upon the Council the power to create branches from the ward to the national level and such other branches as it may deem necessary or desirable for the promotion of youth empowerment and development.
7. The Bill has a total of 4 clauses. The following is a summary of the Bill-
  - a) Clause 1 of the Bill is the short title.
  - b) Clause 2 of the Bill seeks to delete the definition of the term “*Minister*” and substitute therefor the word “*Cabinet Secretary*” to align the Act with Article 260 of the Constitution in respect to reference of the term “Cabinet Secretary”.
  - c) Clause 3 of the Bill seeks to amend section 5 of the National Youth Council Act No. 10 of 2009 to delete the definition of the term “*Permanent Secretary*” and substitute therefor the word “*Principal Secretary*” to align the Act with Article 260 of the Constitution in respect to reference to the term “*Principal Secretary*”.
  - d) The Bill also amends section 5 of the Act to allow for nomination of nine youths through a competitive process by the Cabinet Secretary responsible for youth affairs to be members of the Council.
  - e) Clause 4 of the Bill seeks to amend section 6 of the Act to confer upon the Council the power to create branches from the ward to the national level and such other branches as it may deem necessary or desirable for the promotion of youth empowerment and development.

#### 3.0 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION/STAKEHOLDERS CONSULTATION

8. Article 118(1) (b) of the Constitution and Standing Order 127(3) require Parliament to facilitate public participation and involvement in the legislative and other business of Parliament and its Committees. In compliance with the Article, the Committee, through the placement of advertisements in the print media on 4th April, 2023 (Annex 3), invited the public and interested stakeholders to submit memoranda on the Bill.
9. The Committee received memoranda from Mr. Kevin Rutto, Mr. Kinuthia Ndungu, the Collaborative Centre for Gender and Development, YSO Consortium, North Rift Ambassadors, Inter Parties Youth Forum, Kenya Young Members of County Assemblies, Youth Senate Organization, Uzalendo Afrika Initiative, Article 43, Mwafrika Mwendangu, Nubian Youth Council, ANC Political Party Youth League, Simama Community based organization, The National Youth Council and the Ministry of Youth Affairs, the Arts and Sports. The Committee thereafter held meetings with the Ministry of Youth Affairs, the Arts and Sports and the National Youth Council.
10. The analysis of the submissions made by the public are contained hereunder. The Committee further held a meeting on 4<sup>th</sup> July, 2023 with the sponsor of the Bill, Hon. Hon. Joshua Chepyegon Kandie. The Member's submissions are also contained hereunder.

#### 3.1 SUBMISSIONS BY MR. JAMES KINUTHIA NDUNGU

11. The Bill seeks to depoliticize the membership of the National Youth Council by allowing the competitive recruitment of the youth serving in the Council through the office of the County Directors of youth and to this end supports the Bill.

#### 3.2 SUBMISSIONS BY THE NATIONAL YOUTH COUNCIL

12. The National Youth Council proposed the following amendments to the National Youth Council Act, 2009; -
  - (i) Section 2 of the Act be amended to remove obsolete terms and definitions and replace with operational terms in line with the Constitution.
  - (ii) Section 4 of the Act be amended to harmonize and streamline the functions of Council as follows; -

- a) Paragraph (b) be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision “*monitor, promote and popularize the National Youth Policy and other policies targeting the youth*”.
- b) Paragraph (c) be deleted as policy review is a ministerial function;
- c) Paragraph (d) be deleted as the function of resource mobilization within the government is domiciled under National Treasury.
- d) Paragraph (e) be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision “*lobby for policies and legislation on issues affecting the youth*”.
- e) Paragraph (f) be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision “*Facilitate linkage with other organizations for resource mobilization and to ensure the youth gain access to resources and services appropriate to their needs*”.
- f) Paragraph (g) be deleted as the function is captured within the reviewed function.
- g) Paragraph (h) be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision “*Implement Mentorship programmes aimed at inspiring and promoting the spirit of unity, patriotism, volunteerism and community service among the youth*”.
- h) Paragraph (i) be deleted as formulation of guidelines is a ministerial function.
- i) Paragraph (j) be deleted as the function is captured within the reviewed function h;
- j) Paragraph (k) be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision “*Implement programmes that ensure the government and policy makers are kept informed of the views and aspirations of the youth*”.
- k) Paragraph (n) be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision “*Take steps to ensure the inclusion of youth in decision-making bodies, boards, agencies and other institutions, and organizations of similar nature*”.
- l) Paragraph (o) be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision “*Monitor, promote and popularize affirmative action programmes and funds targeting the youth*”. and
- m) Paragraph (p) be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision “*perform any other functions that may be prescribed by written law and in furtherance of the above named functions*”.

(iii) Section 5 of the Act be amended to allow for an alternative and cost-effective way of properly constituting the Council by-

- a) reducing the number of members constituting the Council and having elections under paragraph g being conducted by the IEBC;
- b) reducing the number of members constituting the Council and have the Youth Serving Organizations conduct the elections; and
- c) reducing the number of members constituting the Council and remove elections and substitute with a competitive recruitment process for the council members under paragraph (g).

- (iv) Section 9 of the Act be amended to allow for the remuneration of Council Members to be determined by the Salaries and Remuneration Commission and be subject to approval by the Cabinet Secretary responsible for finance;
- (v) Section 16 of the Act be amended on the composition of the Youth Advisory Board and allow for membership similar to other Boards of State Corporations; and
- (vi) Section 17 of the Act be amended on the functions of the Youth Advisory Board and avert any potential conflict with those of the Council;
  - a) Paragraph (a) be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision “*Receive and review plans, reports, financial statements and budgets and make recommendations to the Council*”.

**3.4 NORTH RIFT AMBASSADORS, INTER PARTIES YOUTH FORUM, KENYA YOUNG MEMBERS OF COUNTY ASSEMBLIES, YOUTH SENATE ORGANIZATION, UZALENDO AFRIKA INITIATIVE, ARTICLE 43, MWAFFRIKA MWENZANGU, NUBIAN YOUTH COUNCIL, ANC POLITICAL PARTY YOUTH LEAGUE, SIMAMA COMMUNITY BASED ORGANIZATION**

The organizations submitted as follows-

13. The Departmental Committee on Social Protection should ensure the Bill provides more clarity and propose accountability frameworks to the Council. As a council representing the youth in Kenya, accountability must be to the youth and a clear framework and structures should be suggested. Looking at past Councils, it must be clear through the amendment the tenure of office and age limit barring those who circumnavigate around allowable youth age in the Republic of Kenya as provided in the Act.
14. There should be a clear separation of powers beyond the Chair. It is not in the spirit of the Constitution to create 'imperial' chair of councils who only answers to the line ministry Principal Secretary or Cabinet Secretary. The Council must have its own checks and balances- desirably linked to the devolved structure of governance and therefore promoting representation.
15. The proposed qualification of the chairperson of the Council requiring high academic qualifications must be looked at and aligned with recent court ruling on qualifications of 'people's representatives. There many youths with desired leadership qualities across all 47 counties and should have an equal chance to provide leadership for the council.

16. The proposed amendment to the Act is an opportunity to review the Act and make it alive to the devolved dispensation.
17. To promote female leadership and representation the council composition should be adjusted to allow equal gender representation. The cadre of representation must be defined and expanded to include representatives of Political Parties Youth Leagues, Women Leagues, People living with Disabilities leagues under the Political Parties Act, 2011.
18. The amendment proposes elections to be done competitively but leaves a lot of power to the relevant principal secretary.
19. Considering how diverse the youth of Kenya are, the membership of the Council should be expanded from 9 to 17 members.
20. Parliament should make the Bill to be a money Bill under Article 114 of the Constitution and ensure operations of the Council are supported by the exchequer with the relevant Principal Secretary as the accounting officer. This will promote sustainability and shall enable the council to effect its mandate.

### **3.5 SUBMISSIONS BY THE COLLABORATIVE CENTRE FOR GENDER AND DEVELOPMENT**

21. The Collaborative Centre for Gender and Development made the following proposals for amendments to the Bill: -

- (i) Abolish the youth advisory board to be replaced by the Youth council members. The council will assume the role of the advisory board on youth development therefore, there is no justification for having a council and a board within a structure.

**Recommendation:** Abolish advisory boards that will be replaced by the youth council.

- (ii) Amend section 5 of the Act to provide for inclusion of a representative from the Ministry of Gender. Further, amend the education requirement of the Chairperson from undergraduate holder to a *Minimum of Completed Secondary school education with leadership knowledge and capacity on youth issues*. Kenya has a wealthy base of youth with leadership track record that is not pegged on university education.
- (iii) Section 6 of the Act should be amended to provide for an accountability framework that will ensure the allocated resources are adequately used on the youth development agenda.
- (iv) The amendment from *an elective* to a *competitive process* creates an equal opportunity for the youth to participate and present their interest in becoming the Chairpersons. However, a schedule needs to be developed that, will guide on the

recruitment process with specific mentions of the requirements of council members, provide for the term of the council of three years with a possible renewal based on performance to a maximum of two terms or a maximum of one term of three years, and stipulate the age limit of those interested to join the Council to be of 32 years at the time of the application.

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23. The Ministry concurred with proposals as set out under Clause 2, 3(a) and 4 of the amendment Bill. However, it expressed reservations on Clause 3(b)(g) of the amendment Bill which provides for de-politicization of the Council membership. There is need to retain the spirit of youth participation through a democratic process of coming up with the Council.

### **3.8 SUBMISSIONS BY THE HON JOSHUA CHEPYEGON KANDIE**

24. The Hon. Joshua Chepyegon Kandie, the sponsor of the National Youth Council (Amendment) Bill, 2023 submitted that the Bill sought to amend sections 2, 5 and 6 of the National Youth Council Act No. 10 of 2009 to align the Act with Article 260 of the Constitution in respect to reference of the terms “Cabinet Secretary” and the “Principal Secretary”, to allow for nomination of nine youths through a competitive process by the Cabinet Secretary responsible for youth affairs to be members of the Council and to confer upon the Council the power to create branches from the ward to the national level and such other branches as it may deem necessary or desirable for the promotion of youth empowerment and development.

## PART IV

### 4.0 COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS

25. Having considered the submissions made by the public in line with Article 118 of the Constitution and Standing Order 127, the Committee observed as follows-

- (i) The proposed amendments to clause 2 and 3(a) of the Bill are necessary to align the National Youth Council Act No. 10 of 2009 with Article 260 of the Constitution in respect to reference of the terms “Cabinet Secretary” and the “Principal Secretary”.
- (ii) Article 55(b) of the Constitution provides that the state shall take measures, including affirmative action programmes, to ensure that the youth *have opportunities to associate, be represented and participate in political, social, economic and other spheres of life.*
- (iii) The proposed amendment to clause 3(b) of the Bill although intended to depoliticize the membership of the Council, it does not foster the dictates of Article 55(b) of the Constitution which provides that the State should take measures to ensure that the youth have opportunities to be represented and participate in political, social, economic and other spheres of life.
- (iv) Section 4 of the National Youth Council Act, 2009 outlines the key functions of the Council which include regulating and coordinating activities and initiatives relating to the youth. The primary role of the Council is to deal with matters relating to youth affairs and hence there is need for the youth to directly participate and be represented in the Council.
- (v) The proposed amendment to clause 3(b) hence negates the right of the youth to choose and elect their own leaders who shall champion the youth agenda.
- (vi) Whereas the proposed amendment to clause 3(b) seeks to confer upon the Cabinet Secretary responsible for matters relating to the youth with the power to nominate nine youths to the Council, in the submissions by the Ministry of Youth, Arts and Sports, the Ministry expressed reservations with the amendment and observed that there is need to retain the spirit of youth participation through a democratic process of coming up with the Council.
- (vii) Section 5(1) of the National Youth Council Act, 2009 provides for the membership of the Council which comprises of a Chairperson, four Principal Secretaries, the Attorney-General, eight youths elected by the youth, not more than eight youths nominated by the National Youth Congress and the Secretary. From the foregoing, the youths have sixteen representatives out of the total membership of twenty-two persons which is adequate representation to the Council.
- (viii) The proposed amendment to clause 5 of the Bill is necessary to align the functions of the Council with the devolved administrative structures.



- (ix) The various proposed amendments by the stakeholders including proposing to abolish the Youth Advisory Board, streamline the functions of the Council, provide for the remuneration of members of the Council, amend the qualifications for appointment to the Council, rationalize of the membership of the Council to align with the Mwongozo Code of Governance and include other representations into the Board, may offend the provisions of Article 118 of the Constitution on public participation and Standing Order 133(5) which provides that no amendment may be moved to a Bill that deals with a different subject and unduly expands the scope of the Bill.
- (x) The Cabinet Secretary, Ministry of Youth, Arts and Sports should consider conducting a review of the Act to address among other issues matters relating to the composition of the Council and the Youth Advisory Board as contained in its memorandum.

**PART V**

**5.0 COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS**

Pursuant to Standing Order 127, the Committee recommends that the Bill does proceed for Second Reading subject to the following amendment—

**THAT**, clause 3 of the Bill be amended by deleting paragraph (b).

She further submitted that the Council and the Ministry concur with the amendments to Part b, c, e and f that contain the word Permanent Secretary by Deleting the Words Permanent Secretary wherever it appears and substituting therefore the words "Principal Secretary". This amendment would make the act in line with the Constitution.

She submitted that the Ministry and the National Youth Council had reservations to the amendment to Paragraph g that sought to depoliticize the National Youth Council stating that

it would deprive the youth of their desired representation in the Council from their different regions.

The Council further proposed that the section 5(1)g be deleted and substituted thereof with the following new provision five youth elected by the youth in such manner as may be prescribed through a regulation. The Committee was hesitant to further amendment away from what the Hon. Joshua Kandie, M.P. sought to amend.

The Council also proposed to have a new clause 5(2A) be inserted immediately after clause 5(2). **The Committee was also hesitant to this proposal as this would change the whole content of the Amendment Bill as the owner of the Bill had intended.**

Affairs Manager, Tabitha Mutemi, and the chairman of the North Eastern Province Professionals Forum, Dr. Abdirtzak Arale Nunow, both responded to him in subsequent articles.

Around this time, the commission received an invitation to travel to the Philippines to study a new electoral system that they had introduced. The International Foundation for Electoral Systems (IFES) funded the five-day trip for a few members of the commission. Mike Yard, an expert in election administration and technology, was the IFES country director for Kenya at the time. He worked closely with us in the journey to reforms in our electoral process. IFES had been involved in Kenya since 1992, contributing to the evolution of a more independent and stronger electoral management body, and helping to promote cohesive and non-violent elections. They assisted with logistical planning, training, voter education and electoral technology. Two days before we travelled, my personal assistant, Noor Awadh, came into my office holding a document. She looked perturbed and visibly shaken. She explained that it had probably been accidentally or unintentionally forwarded to her by Oswago's personal assistant, Allan Odongo.

"Chairman, you need to have a look at this, this is not good at all," she said.

After reading through the document, I called (Davis) Chirchir, (Ken) Nyaundi and Winnie (Guchu) and showed it to them. They were adversely mentioned in the email trail. It was a dossier on the IIEC, casting aspersions on the integrity of the commissioners and raising the profile of the CEO as the main person behind the success of the electoral body. The document alleged that I was employing relatives while Winnie was accused of nepotism, seeking publicity and supposedly controlling me. We decided that we needed to get to the bottom of the matter discreetly. Chirchir and I were preparing to travel to the Philippines. We agreed to cancel the trip and investigate the matter, so we did not show up at the airport on the day we were to travel. Oswago and three other members of staff were to travel with probably thought we were running late and would be joining them, so they proceeded to board the plane on the morning of the flight.

We summoned Allan to a meeting so he could explain the contents of the documents we were holding. Though looking shocked, he refused to talk and denied having anything to do with it. He claimed that he was not the source, and that he had no clue where it came from. The particular article linked to the contents we found in Allan's computer had been published by a Mr. Boaz Gikonyo in *The Star* newspaper on 2nd August, 2011, and was titled 'Tribalism, Nepotism are rife at IIEC'. The commissioners had been perturbed by this article as it seemed to lean towards a smear campaign against us.

We decided to investigate the

matter further. This article was among the documents found in Allan's laptop, word for word. It was a shocking discovery for all of us. I was particularly offended by the allegation of nepotism against me. Not only was it false, but I had actually removed my brother from the shortlist for the position of the manager, Voter Education, which he was qualified for. This even created bad blood between us, as he complained to my mother.

We found other write-ups in his laptop, which were probably waiting to be published in the newspaper. Allan was adamant and refused to co-operate on the matter. We informed him that we would confiscate his office laptop. We called in staff from the IT, Risk and Compliance department to scan through it. They discovered that he had deleted all the related information from the computer, which only left us with the hard copy we had printed. He tried to defend himself, but we knew he was involved in something sinister. We decided to carry out a forensic audit on the laptop, which took the staff the whole day. Allan realised he was in deep trouble when the IT team came back in the evening, at about 6pm, with a comprehensive report after retrieving information that had been deleted from the laptop.

They showed us the trail of other articles we had been reading about the commission in the newspapers, particularly those that were written by Boaz Gikonyo. We could see a number of other documents whose source was unknown, including the dates they had been edited, with the trail leading back to Allan. It was unbelievably bizarre that he still denied culpability, even after he was confronted with all the evidence. Interestingly, Nzibo firmly stood by his side and told us that we could not take any action on him as yet, until we probed the matter further. The commission decided to suspend him on the spot until we could deal with the issue and with his boss. We called for a press conference and disclosed the information we had just discovered that day.

Meanwhile, Oswago found out that we were not on the plane, and thereafter he got wind of what had transpired. He called me while still attending the training sessions in the Philippines. I informed him that we were going to sack him, as we had discovered what he and his PA had been up to.

"Oh no, Chairman, please wait," he said. "Let me get back, I need to explain this to you."

In panic, he immediately cut short the trip after the first two days. He was full of apologies when we eventually met. As annoying as it was, he displayed the same traits as his PA—denying any involvement in the dossier we had discovered.

"Please Chairman, it was not me. Please give me a little bit more time to investigate my PA and get to the bottom of this thing," he begged.

I let him know that the commis-

sion was not going to be taken for a ride and that he should just admit he was guilty. Many of the documents we discovered contained detailed information about commission meetings we had convened, with him in attendance. The exact timelines when I adjourned the meetings to attend prayers, or at the end of the day were captured, as well as the discussions we had in the meeting. There was no way an outsider could have been the source of these details, and I informed him as much. The evidence pointed at him, as there were mentions of particular conversations by the commissioners.

The commissioners were also fed up, and they were in agreement that he should be sacked, though three of them were still against it. These were Nzibo, (Simiyu Abud) Wasike and (Douglas) Mwashigadi. Nzibo was a former civil servant, and his wife, Dr. Sally Kosgei, was the ODM Member of Parliament for Aldai Constituency, and a minister in the coalition government. As part of the needed strategic considerations in a coalition government, I called the Permanent Secretary to the Prime Minister, Dr. Mohammed Isahakiah, to let him know that we were about to sack Oswago. He advised that I should first see the Prime Minister before proceeding with this decision, and I made an ap-

pointment to meet him. The PA to the Prime Minister, Major Idriiss Abdurahman, also reached out to me and told me to be cautious on the matter. The concern of the two was that Oswago was the only 'Luo' face in the top leadership of the commission. When I finally had the Prime Minister's audience, I went straight to the point.

"Prime Minister, we have evidence against Oswago and his PA. They have been leaking information to the media, and the commission has decided to sack him," I said, as I displayed the documents before him. The Prime Minister seemed to be in deep thought. He stood up, walked to the window of his office, and looked outside.

"This is very bad, Chairman, very bad," he said.


He then made a request that the commission should allow Oswago to stay and not sack him, insisting that he would talk to him. He pointed out that it would be good for him as the Prime Minister if Oswago stayed. He reminded me that the commission needed the support of his office. Being in a coalition government meant that the two coalition partners would be critical in the formation of IIEC, which would take over after IIEC's two-year term came to an end in November 2011. It was clear from the Constitution that the President would appoint the new commissioners in consulta-

tion with the Prime Minister.

"Since I was scheduled to travel to Mombasa for a couple of days, I finalised booking for the flight and travelled on the morning the commission meeting was to happen. The IIEC only had a de facto vice chair at the time, so in my absence and that of a vice, no meeting could be convened. I knew that the blazing tempers against Oswago among the commissioners would have subsided by the following week. Gladys was deeply disappointed by this decision. She told me that I had lost a golden opportunity to sack Oswago while the iron was still hot. She had also hoped to take up the CEO position.

Eventually, we confiscated Oswago's official laptop and sent him on administrative leave for two weeks as we conducted a forensic audit. We gave the laptop to our staff, who did the same audit as they had on Allan's machine. It was not a surprise when they retrieved the exact documents and details found in Allan's laptop, though he had also deleted them. It was a terribly disconcerting discovery of all the malicious articles against us that we had been reading in the newspapers. The agenda was to paint me and the commission in negative light. This further deepened the wedge in our interactions, as we could no longer

I stumble over my words. In my time at the IIEC, I saw Jamila Mohamed, a journalist with Citizen TV, utter words slowly to me. Miguna stated at the end of the debate that the views expressed were his own. However, he signed with his job title, as the advisor to the Prime Minister on constitutional affairs. Chairman, I often visited the Prime Minister's Office. I engaged with staff there, for some reason, I never met Miguna in person. Because of the Muslim capers, I initially thought he was a Nubian from Kibera, one of the affirmative action recruits of the Prime Minister. During the time in the grand coalition, Miguna had cemented his reputation as a leader who favoured marginalised communities, appointing them to key positions in his office and in the cabinet. What baffled me, however, was why Miguna was gnostic towards me, as he was vilified in the media for his vitriol and bile. The commission's communication and Corporate

# Ruto meets House leaders ahead of talks

President wants Parliament to come up with a win-win situation for both sides of the political divide.

Ichungwah says they agreed to work under the ambit of Parliament with an ad hoc committee.

President William Ruto met with the Kenya Kwanza parliamentary leadership at State House, Nairobi, yesterday, to discuss the bipartisan talks with Azimio.

This came a day after the Head of State proposed a bipartisan approach through Parliament to address issues raised by Azimio leader Raila Odinga.

"We are convinced that the issues raised by the opposition shall be considered by Parliament to focus on our economic development programme, that is why we met to establish a framework for a bipartisan strategy," said Ruto.

The President met with Deputy President Rigathi Gachagua, National

Assembly Majority Leader Kimani Ichungwah, Senate Majority Leader Aaron Cheruiyot, National Assembly Majority Whip Silvanus Osoro and National Assembly Deputy Majority Leader Owen Baya.

Others were Senate Deputy Majority Leader Tabitha Karanja, National Assembly Deputy Majority Whip Naomi Waqo and Senate Majority Whip Steve Lelegwe.

Ichungwah who spoke to journalists after the meeting said the Kenya Kwanza leadership in Parliament had agreed on a framework for the proposal made by the President and the counter-proposal made by Raila.

The National Assembly Majority Leader said they agreed to work under the ambit of Parliament with an ad hoc committee in place and they were already consulting with the Minority leadership to ensure consensus.

Ichungwah said they are yet to agree on the number of members of the ad hoc committee and whether they need experts as was proposed by Azimio.

"What I know is the President is not going to take the country into a 2018 situation like where there was a handshake but he is keener on the bipartisan approach since even our

opponents may be having better ideas on how some of these issues should be handled," he said.

The National Assembly Majority Leader said the President wants Parliament to take its rightful role in addressing the issues raised by the opposition since he had already sent a memorandum to the House in December last year, which among

others, proposed the creation of the office of Leader of Official Opposition.

"The President is basically asking Parliament to play its rightful role in looking into the proposals made by the opposition and come up with a win-win situation for both sides of the political divide. We are engaging our colleagues in ensuring this is achieved," he said.

Ichungwah said their opponents

have acknowledged that disruption of economic activities was doing more harm than good by making the cost of living even higher and that demonstrations will never be a solution to the challenges faced by all Kenyans.

National Assembly Minority Leader Opiyo Wandayi told The Standard that the Azimio leadership stood by what Raila said on Sunday evening in Nairobi.

"We are only waiting for the formation of the bipartisan ad hoc committee so that we can keenly look at the issues raised by our leader Raila and how the Kenya Kwanza administration will ensure the issues are urgently addressed," said Wandayi.

The Director of Public Prosecution Nordin Haji has dropped charges against six Azimio politicians for participating in demonstrations which is a clear indicator that the government has heeded one of the demands made by Raila.

Senate Minority Leader Stewart Madzayo, National Assembly Minority Leader Opiyo Wandayi, Kilifi South MP Richard Chonga and Malindi MP Amina Mnyazi had their cases dropped, with the prosecution saying this will pave way for alternative settlement among the aggrieved parties.

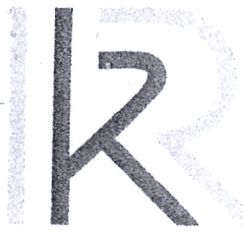
## 1.0 Our Proposed Amendments

1.1 Our proposed sections for amendments to the principal Act are as follows;

1. **Section 2** to remove obsolete terms and definitions and replace with current operational terms in line with the constitution;
2. **Section 4** to harmonize and streamline the functions of NYC;
  - a) **Paragraph b** be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision "*monitor, promote and popularize the National Youth Policy and other policies targeting the youth*";
  - b) **Paragraph c** be deleted as policy review is a ministerial function;
  - c) **Paragraph d** be deleted as the function of resource mobilization within the government is domiciled under National Treasury;
  - d) **Paragraph e** be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision "*lobby for policies and legislation on issues affecting the youth*"
  - e) **Paragraph f** be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision "*Facilitate linkage with other organizations for resource mobilization and to ensure the youth gain access to resources and services appropriate to their needs*";
  - f) **Paragraph g** be deleted as the function is captured within the reviewed function f;
  - g) **Paragraph h** be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision "*Implement Mentorship programmes aimed at inspiring and promoting the spirit of unity, patriotism, volunteerism and community service among the youth*";
  - h) **Paragraph i** be deleted as formulation of guidelines is a ministerial function;
  - i) **Paragraph j** be deleted as the function is captured within the reviewed function h;
  - j) **Paragraph k** be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision "*Implement programmes that ensure the government and policy makers are kept informed of the views and aspirations of the youth*";
  - k) **Paragraph n** be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision "*Take steps to ensure the inclusion of youth in decision-making bodies, boards, agencies and other institutions, and organizations of similar nature*";
  - l) **Paragraph o** be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision "*Monitor, promote and popularize affirmative action programmes and funds targeting the youth*"; and

- m) **Paragraph p** be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision "*perform any other functions that may be prescribed by written law and in furtherance of the above named functions*".
3. **Section 5** to allow for an alternative and cost effective way of properly constituting the Council;
- a) Reduce the number of members constituting the Council and having elections under paragraph g being conducted by the IEBC;
  - b) Reduce the number of members constituting the Council and have the Youth Serving Organizations conduct the elections;
  - c) Reduce the number of members constituting the Council and remove elections and substitute with a competitive recruitment process for the council members under paragraph g;
4. **Section 9** to amend the part on remuneration of the Council and allow for the remuneration of Council Members to be determined by SRC and be subject to approval by the CS responsible for finance;
5. **Section 16** to amend the Composition of the Youth Advisory Board and allow for membership similar to other Boards of State Corporations; and
6. **Section 17** to amend the functions of the Youth Advisory Board and avert any potential clash with those of the Council;
- a) **Paragraph a** be deleted and substituted therefor with the following new provision "*Receive and review plans, reports, financial statements and budgets and make recommendations to the Council*".

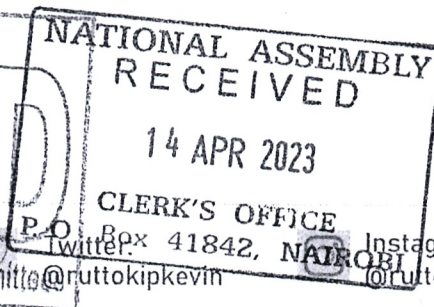

WE the youth in the Republic of Kenya under article 36 of the Constitution of Kenya 2010 have come together to submit a joint memorandum outlining key issues for consideration into the Bill in reference.

RECOGNISING that public participation is a right under our constitution, we appreciate the National Assembly for giving the public an opportunity to submit their view on the Bill.

APPRECIATING that the youth aged 35 years and below comprise 80% of Kenya's population according to data from the National Council for Population & Development<sup>1</sup> released in 2021. The Government of Kenya over the past decades has made significant investment targeting the youth in education, access to capital, health among other different sectors.

In the past elections, we are seeing a remarkable trend of increase in youth leaders across both houses of parliament and county assemblies. This truly affirms our position that they youth in Kenya are key players to steer our country's development, growth and transformation in these current times we live in and beyond. Any conversation and process to define youth involvement in governance must therefore be centered to consider views of the youth in Kenya.










HOWEVER, worth noting is that the youth are the most affected by modern day challenges facing Kenya. A high percentage of our educated youth are unemployed, a good number of youth engage in harmful vices and the fact is youth despite being the majority are marginalized in government decision making at both national and sub-national levels.




THEREFORE, the National Youth Council is an important organ to promote inclusion and involvement of youth and ensure their issues are included in policy development. Having interacted with the Bill circulated in the public under Kenya Gazette Supplement No. 11 (National Assembly Bills No. 1) we are making the following proposals:

1. National Assembly Departmental Committee on Social Protection should ensure the bill provides more clarity and propose accountability frameworks to this Council. As a council representing the youth in Kenya, accountability must be to the youth and a clear framework and structures should be suggested. Looking at past Councils, it must be clear through this amendment the tenure of office and age limit barring those who circumnavigate around allowable youth age in the Republic of Kenya as provided in the Act. Also, on accountability, we must see clear separation of powers beyond the Chair. It is not in the spirit of the constitution to create 'imperial' chair of councils who only answers to the line ministry Principal Secretary or Cabinet Secretary. The Council must have its own checks and balances- desirably linked to our devolved structure of governance and therefore promoting representation.
2. The proposed qualification of the chairperson of the council requiring high academic qualifications must be looked at and aligned with recent court ruling on qualifications of 'people's representatives. E.g. MCA, MP etc. We believe, there are many youths with desired leadership qualities across all 47 counties and should have an equal chance to provide leadership for the council.
3. The proposed amendment to the Act is an opportunity to review the Act and make it alive to our devolved dispensation. What structures will exist to promote participation and representation across counties or regions in Kenya. This can be looked up alongside point #1 above to enhance accountability.
4. To promote female leadership and representation, we propose the language be adjusted to council composition be of equal gender representation. These representatives will be drawn from various special interest groups including persons living with disability and other important sectors of our economy that are youth driven. The cadre of representation must be defined and expanded- including representatives of Political Parties Youth Leagues/Women Leagues/PLWD leagues under our Political Parties Act.

5. The amendment proposes elections be done competitively but leaves a lot of power to the relevant principal secretary. We propose that a clear system be defined and be clear in law. How this can be done systematically using devolved structures.
6. Considering how diverse the youth of Kenya are, we propose expansion of the Council from 9 to 17 members.
7. Parliament should make this Bill to be a money bill under article 114 and ensure operations of the Council are supported by the exchequer with the relevant Principal Secretary as the accounting officer. This will promote sustainability and enables this council to indecently effect its mandate.

We the undersigned hope that our submissions will be considered. We look forward to an opportunity to engage the committee on this matter using avenues stipulated by Parliament Standing orders and guide operations of committees.

### 1. INTRODUCTION

The Collaborative Centre for Gender and Development (CCGD) was established in 1996 by a small group of academics, researchers, and development experts to build capacity in gender-responsive planning, advocacy, and programming. It has since grown into a dependable policy research and advocacy resource organization with a program present at the county, national and regional levels. CCGD conducts and utilizes research evidence for its advocacy work. It seeks to promote and contribute to a transformative shift in gender relations through gender-responsive capacity building and institutional development of all sectors in planning, budgeting, programming, implementation, monitoring, and evaluation. To accelerate the achievement of gender equality, CCGD works through multisector partnerships between international, regional, and national government agencies as well as civil society and private sector interests to promote institutional accountability to gender-responsive governance and equitable development that secures rights and enables empowerment of in particular women and girls. CCGD contributes to supporting policy solutions that create greater investments in gender equality gains to protect the rights of -in particular women and to realize holistic development as envisaged in the UN Strategic Development Goals (SDGs).

### 2. BACKGROUND

Following the publication on public participation by the National Assembly on the National Youth Council Amendment Act, 2023, the following are the joint Collaborative Centre for Gender and Development analysis and proposals on the bill:

*Constitutional alignment*



- CCGD has recognized the bill's alignment with the current governance system that will facilitate adoption and implementation by devolved governments as primary actors. It will inform resource allocation to support youth development by the County Youth departments.
- The explicit mention of gender, sex, and ability of membership will ensure gender sensitivity of the council and promote inclusion in representation

### 3. PROPOSALS

1. Abolish the Youth advisory board to be replaced by the Youth council members

The council will assume the role of the advisory board on youth development therefore, there is no justification for having a council and a board within a structure. Recommendation: Abolish advisory boards that will be replaced by the youth council

2. Section 5

- a) On the alternate, CCGD recommends the inclusion of a representative from the Ministry of Gender.

Youth, the highest population in Kenya, inform gender discussions where equality is anchored. Young women as a marginalized and vulnerable group are always left out in development decision-making spaces due to the socially constructed roles they perform that limit their participation. The youth population of people with disabilities is in most cases ignored as an interested party. The proposed composition of the council requires someone with gender knowledge to guide and support mainstreaming of affirmative action to include marginalized youth and ensure equality

- b) Amend the education requirement of the Chairperson from *Undergraduate* holder to a *Minimum of Completed Secondary school education with demonstratable leadership knowledge and capacity on youth issues*

Kenya has a wealth base of youth with a leadership track record that is not pegged on university education. CCGD is cognizant of poverty and other vulnerabilities that young people are exposed to particularly in the ASAL areas that limit their full access to higher education opportunities.

3. Section 6: Power of the Council; Development of an Accountability Framework of the Council

As the council will be able to attract and receive knowledge and financial resources, there should be an accountability mechanism/framework that will ensure the received resources are adequately used on the youth development agenda.

Recommendation: Inclusion of an accountability mechanism

4. Development of a Third schedule

The amendment from *Elective* to *Competitive* creates an equal opportunity for the youth to participate and present their interest in becoming the Chairpersons. However, a schedule needs to be developed that, will guide on the following:

- Recruitment process with specific mentions of the requirements of council members
- Term of the council of three years with a possible renewal based on performance to a maximum of two terms or a maximum of one term of three years
- The considerable age limit of those interested to join the council should be of 32 years at the time of the application

These are the humble proposals on the National Youth Council Amendment Bill, 2023 by Collaborative Centre for Gender and Development.

Article 37 of The Constitution of Kenya: Providing for the Right of every Kenyan to present petitions to public authorities in General.

Article 55(b) of the Constitution mandates the state to take measures for the youth have opportunities to be represented and participate in political, social, economic spaces. Further on, in preparation for Africa's youth bulge and succession planning, cognizant of best practices of the Commonwealth Youth Council, East Africa Youth Commission and Africa Youth Commission,

Article 55(b) necessitates an urgent move to harness the youth demographic dividend for economic prosperity of the nation.

Article 118 (1) (b) of The Constitution of Kenya: Requiring Parliament to facilitate public participation and involvement in the legislative and other business of Parliament and its committees.

Article 119 (1) Providing for every person's right to petition Parliament to consider any matter within its authority, including to enact, amend or repeal any legislation.

That the Memoranda is on the matter of The National Youth Council Amendment Bill 2023, being a Bill for AN ACT of Parliament to **depoliticize the membership of the National youth council by allowing competitive recruitment of the youth serving in the council through the office of the County Directors of Youth.**

## **Rationale**

The pioneers of the establishment of the National Youth Council had envisioned a great institution where young people would exercise their democratic right to elect their representatives at the Council. Since establishment of the initial council by way of elections in 2012, the council has not had elections for varied reasons including insufficient resources to conduct nationwide elections.

In 2019, an amendment bill was tabled by the then youth representative in the national assembly Hon Gideon Keter seeking to depoliticize the council to enable its operations. However, the young people insisted on the elections process and further the election guidelines were developed. Despite the development of elections guidelines, 3 years later elections have not taken place.

For the secretariat to function effectively, the council needs to be in place to take care of certain functions prescribed in the act such as hiring of Chief Executive Officer. For this purpose, the youth serving organizations have found it reasonable to adopt a model that would ensure the running of the institution and also ensures participation of young people through an open and transparent competitive recruitment process.

To which some of the candidates who participate in the process can form the assembly of the council and respective county chapters.

That the undersigned being Youth Serving Organizations variously registered in accordance with the Laws in the Republic of Kenya and implementing objectives, initiatives, programs and activities in furtherance of the Welfare and interests of the Youth in the Republic.

And as such there being a direct and legitimate interest in the provisions of The National Youth Council Bill 2019, the composition of the council, its management and effective functioning.
