Chapter III: Priorities

- Policies, institutional and legal frameworks: ensure that disaster risk is a national and a local priority with a strong institutional basis for implementation.
- Risk identification: Identify, assess and monitor disaster risks and enhance early warning.
- Knowledge management: Use knowledge, innovation and education to build a culture of safety and resilience at all levels.
- Reduce the underlying risk factors (environmental mgt, food security, gender approach, land-use planning, etc.).

Engaging Parliamentarians - Why?

- Making disaster risk reduction a national and local priority requires <u>sustainability of political commitment</u>, with strong support from national legislatures;
- National legislators often have certain oversight functions in policy changes and budget allocation, in addition to their primary role in the formulation of <u>new legislations</u> as necessary;
- Legislators can play an important role to <u>bridge the existing</u> gap between national policy and local implementation in disaster risk reduction.

The initiative has carried out a set of activities, including:


- Targeted high level advocacy for ownership and leadership building of the parliamentarians for this initiative;

- Promote budget allocation and raise funds for DRR in their countries to move from polices to concrete projects and actions.







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
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
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



















