REVIEW OF THE SISAL INDUSTRY - JANUARY TO DECEMBER, 1990

a). Sisal Production

Kenya's output of sisal continued to recover in 1990 as compared with the low levels of production realized in 1987 and 1988. The recovery actually started during the 1988/89 season as a result of good climatic conditions and in response to a sustained export demand and rising fibre prices. Production of small-holder sisal increased by a substantial margin of 1,142 tons of fibre over the figure for 1989.

A total of 39,617 metric tons of fibre and tow was produced during the year under review. This represents an increase in production amounting to 1,878 tons above the 1989 level. Output of small - holder sisal fibre totalled 3,776 tons.

Once again, the annual target for small-holder sisal production was not achieved. The board's plans aim at raising production of small-holder sisal back to the 1984 level when small scale farmers produced over 14,000 tons of fibre for both the domestic and overseas markets. Efforts will therefore be intensified to deal with the constraints affecting the planned expansion of the small-holder sisal production to about twenty five per cent of the total between the 1987/88 and 1992/93 seasons.

On a regional basis production of all grades of sisal fibre and tow during the last two calender years was as follows:-

b) Sisal Marketing and Manufactures

The upward trend in sisal fibre prices which began in mid 1988 continued throughout 1990 although there were signs of a slackening demand towards the end of the year. The increase in prices has been more marked for the lower grades, such that the differential between the 3L and UG grades narrowed from the level of about US \$100 in 1987 to around \$30 per ton in mid 1990. This narrowing of the gap, although tending to discourage high quality fibre output, is very welcome to the farmer in view of the ever rising sisal production costs.

During 1990, the country exported 30,829 metric tons of line fibre and tow. This figure is below the 32,223 tons exported in 1989 but the short fall is well compensated by the higher level of prices during the year 1990. Foreign exchange receipts from the sale of the fibre and tow in 1990 amounted to the equivalent of Ksh. 378,003,422. The corresponding figure for 1989 was Ksh. 318,460,343. The average price of exported fibre in 1990 was therefore Ksh. 12,262 per ton. The ten leading buyers of our sisal, by countries were, Japan, South Korea, United Kingdom; Egypt; U.S.S.R.; Spain; Taiwan; Belgium; Portugal and Pakistan in that order. All together however, thirty countries imported sisal fibre from Kenya in 1990.

Sales of sisal fibre in the domestic market were lower in 1990 than during the previous year. A total of 6,792 metric tons of fibre was sold to the local spinning mills. The value of these local sales was Ksh. 52,339,152. The average price of the largely small-holder sisal, in the domestic market was therefore Kshs. 7,706 per ton. In 1989, a total of 7,930 tons of fibre worth Ksh. 45,539,555 was sold to the domestic market.

The domestic sisal spinning factories produced a total of 4,213 tons of sisal manufactures. These consisted mainly of twine/yarn; coffee bags; tea harvest bags; rope and sisal cloth. Unfortunately the manufacture of sisal/jute grain sacks has been adversely affected by the problems facing the East African Bag and Cordage factory. In fact the country is currently not producing any sisal/jute grain sacks. This situation may soon cause a crisis in the supply of this essential item for the agricultural sector.

Export of sisal manufactures consisted mainly of twines/yarns and cloth. Special efforts will in future be made in order to ensure the use of greater amounts of sisal fibre locally for the manufacture of these and other sisal export items.

c). Sisal Board Operations

The Board's financial position improved substantially during 1990. As the accompanying audited accounts show, the Board did for the first time in many years, realize a surplus from the 1989/90 operational budget.

The Board is consequently already implementing a small-holder sisal rehabilitation and expansion project. The first phase of this project is covering South Nyanza and Kilifi districts. Plans are also underway to start a scaled -down project involving the re-establishment of sisal research which was virtually abandoned in 1974. The small research programme will include sisal clonal selection of two commercial species (Agave Sisalana and Hybrid 11 648), a sisal variety trials project; and a Gene Bank of agaves.

The Board will however continue to experience a shortage of funds for development and research purposes. This will in turn hamper efforts to boost sisal fibre production towards the target of slightly over seventy thousand tons by the year 2000.

NOTE 9 CESS INCOME

Cess Income is charged on the farmers on the basis of Kshs. 30 per ton of sisal produced hence a total of 36,985 tons produced thus raising a gross income of K£ 55,478.

NOTE 10 INSPECTION SERVICE CHARGE

Inspection Service Charge is a new source of revenue that was identified n October 1989. This is based on 0.5% of the gross value of sisal exported. During the 1989/90 sisal worth K£15,976,800 was sold out of the country.

NOTE 11: EXPORT LICENCE FEES

This is also a new source of revenue that was identified in October 1989. This fee is based on a charge of KShs. 50 for every export licence processed. In 1989/90 a total of 459 export licences were processed thus giving a gross income of K£1,147.

NOTE 12 MISCELLANEOUS INCOME

Miscellaneous income is derived from licences granted to sisal estates to process sisal in their factories, licences for agencies (buying of sisal from the farmers), interest charge on staff advances (8%) and other sundry sources.
